## Celebrate the Power of Story The Santa Fe International Literary Festival May 19–21, 2023

**Santa Fe, NM**—The Santa Fe International Literary Festival will take place May 19-21, 2023, bringing together world-renowned authors, thinkers, and passionate readers.

Rich in cultural diversity and creativity, Santa Fe is home to this three-day international festival dedicated to celebrating a shared love of writing and ideas. Authors will explore issues at a time of extraordinary change—in politics, race, immigration, the environment, sustainability, and more—as well as offer good old-fashioned storytelling.

With more than thirty different events, SFILF is headquartered downtown at the Santa Fe Community Convention Center. The Festival kicks off Friday evening, May 19, 2023, followed by three days of programming, including large and small lectures and conversations, and walking tours with acclaimed authors.

In addition, a weekend community stage will feature a Santa Fe youth poetry slam, as well as a range of inspired free programming featuring local youth. On Monday, festivalgoers will have a chance to experience and explore the cultural treasures and spectacular landscapes of Northern New Mexico as authors take a deep dive into captivating topics during a series of small full- and half-day excursions.

A community event calendar will feature other literary happenings around town in the days before and after the Festival, including free author signings and readings.

### The Santa Fe International Literary Festival Announces 2023 Lineup of Literary Stars from Near and Far

May 19–21, 2023

John Irving, Jennifer Egan, Gillian Flynn, Colum McCann, Diana Gabaldon, Namwali Serpell, Ed Yong, David Quammen, and Luis Alberto Urrea are among the featured authors

Santa Fe, NM, January 30, 2023—<u>The Santa Fe International Literary Festival</u> will take place May 19–21, 2023, bringing together world-renowned authors, thinkers, and passionate readers to celebrate the power of story.

The three-day festival features big-stage presentations, intimate conversations, and walking tours with literary heroes from near and far. In all, more than thirty different festival events will take place over the weekend at the Santa Fe Community Convention Center in Santa Fe's historic downtown.

Rich in cultural diversity and creativity, including a literary tradition that stretches back centuries, this beautiful, maverick city of Santa Fe is a perfect host for the Festival. At a time of extraordinary change, when the world seems so convulsed by conflict and intolerance, authors and readers from around the world and close to home come together over the course of three remarkable days to explore a range of issues—in politics, social and racial justice, race, the environment, and much more. We believe the Santa Fe International Literary Festival should be an important light against the dark, where the power of words, ideas, and stories capture the experience of being alive in the world; where our sense of community is strengthened; and where our shared humanity is recognized and celebrated.

Colum McCann, the celebrated Irish author of *Let the Great World Spin*, winner of the National Book Award, and the global bestseller *Apeirogon*, kicks off the festival Friday evening, May 19. Also featured during the long weekend of programming will be Jennifer Egan, Pulitzer Prize–winning author of *A Visit from the Goon Squad* and *The Candy House*; John Irving, legendary author of *The World According to Garp and The Cider House Rules*; *Santa Fe's own Michael McGarrity, author of the New York*

*Times* bestselling Kevin Kerney crime novels; Beth Macy, renowned journalist and author of *Dopesick* and *Raising Lazarus*; Denise Chávez, of Las Cruces, a fronteriza writer, activist, and author of *The King and Queen of Comezón* and *Loving Pedro Infante*; and others.

The festival recently added "International" to its name, representing a desire to reflect the vast diversity of the world's literary community. The 2023 festival thus hosts an impressive list of international luminaries. In addition to McCann, they include:

- The Mexico-born Luis Alberto Urrea, acclaimed author of *The Devil's Highway* and the soon-to-be-released *Good Night, Irene*.
- Moroccan author Laila Lalami, whose 2015 book, *The Moor's Account* was a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize.
- Bogotá, Colombia's Ingrid Rojas Contreras, author of *The Man Who Could Move Clouds*, a 2022 National Book Award finalist.
- Zambian American writer Namwali Serpell, Harvard University professor and author of the award-winning books *The Old Drift* and *The Furrows*.
- Ed Yong, born in Malaysia, a Pulitzer Prize—winning science writer and author of *I Contain Multitudes* and *An Immense World*.

### Other festival weekend highlights include:

Community Stage and Lunch: During the Saturday and Sunday lunch hours, some of New Mexico's most talented up-and-coming writers will perform on the festival's Community Stage. With free admission, visitors can expect powerful slam poetry, music, riveting readings, and more. Food trucks will be on-site, and box lunches can be ordered in advance.

Remembering Rudolfo Anaya: At 2 p.m. on Sunday, May 21, acclaimed authors Denise Chávez and Luis Alberto Urrea present "Recuerdos y Respeto: Homage to Rudolfo Anaya," a tribute to the legacy of the late New Mexico author Rudolfo Anaya, the celebrated godfather of Chicano literature and recipient of the National Medal of Arts. Chávez and Urrea, whose writings and perspectives are deeply influenced by Anaya, will share personal reminiscences of their friendship with the author, insights on his literary legacy, and select readings of his works.

Community Events and Literary Day Trips: On the Wednesday and Thursday before the Festival and the Monday after, enjoy numerous book signings and literary events around town. Festivalgoers will also have a chance to experience Northern New Mexico during a series of small-group full-and half-day excursions with authors exploring their favorite topics while touring cultural treasures and spectacular landscapes.

**SFILF Young Writers & Readers:** The Santa Fe International Literary Festival's pilot program partners with local schools and nonprofit organizations to help our community's youngest writers tell their stories. We are also collaborating with local literacy nonprofits that provide free tutoring for adults in reading, writing, and speaking English. Their experience tells us that 46 percent of New Mexicans read at or below a seventh-grade level, severely impacting opportunities for employment and other areas of life. We want to help change that by spotlighting the power of story at the Festival.

### N. Scott Momaday, Legendary Pulitzer Prize—Winning Author, to Lead 2023 Santa Fe International Literary Festival as Honorary Chair

### A Lifetime Dedicated to the Power of Story

**Santa Fe, NM**—N. Scott Momaday, the preeminent Kiowa poet and Pulitzer Prize—winning author, will serve as Honorary Chair of the 2023 Santa Fe International Literary Festival, on May 19–21 at the Santa Fe Community Convention Center. The designation recognizes Momaday's legacy as an author, storyteller, and educator who has dedicated his life to the power of language and story.

Momaday, a longtime Santa Fe resident with deep New Mexico roots, was a featured author at the inaugural Literary Festival in 2022. As Honorary Chair, he will attend this year's festival as its most distinguished guest.

"I am truly delighted to serve as Honorary Chair of the Santa Fe Literary Festival 2023," Momaday said. "I participated in the first festival last year and know it to have been a great success. Santa Fe has long been an important center for the arts, and the Literary Festival adds significantly to our international reputation and to our dedication to the great tradition of literature itself."

"We couldn't possibly be more honored to have N. Scott Momaday as not just a friend of the Festival but our Honorary Chair," said Mark Bryant, Santa Fe International Literary Festival co-founder and chief curator. "Poet, playwright, essayist, painter, Pulitzer Prize winner, and international treasure, Scott is legend. His profound and revolutionary work—*House Made of Dawn* and *The Ancient Child*, to name just two of his many books—has inspired generations of readers and writers around the world. We're extremely privileged to have him with us over the Festival weekend."

Momaday was born in Oklahoma but spent most of his youth in the Southwest, most significantly at Walatowa, Jemez Pueblo, where he lived from age 12 to 17. He studied poetry at the University of New Mexico because of its kinship to the oral traditions of the Kiowa and the Towa-speaking people of Jemez. He earned his Ph.D from Stanford University and a teaching post at the University of California, Santa Barbara, followed.

In 1969, at 35, Momaday rocketed onto the international literary scene when his first novel, *House Made of Dawn*, set at Jemez Pueblo, won the Pulitzer Prize for fiction. The prize elevated Momaday as the premier Native writer of the 20th century and a singular voice in American letters. He has since published 17 books, from his bestselling *The Way to Rainy Mountain*, in 1969, to *The Names*, in 1976, to 2020's *Earth Keeper: Reflections on the American Land* and *Dream Drawings: Configurations of a Timeless Kind*, in 2022.

Today, Momaday is credited with preserving Native oral traditions and inspiring generations of Indigenous writers, scholars, and activists to stay connected to the ancestors and the land.

He is the recipient of countless international honors, including the National Medal of Arts, the nation's highest honor for lifetime achievement, and the Academy of American Poets Prize. He is also the subject of the 2019 PBS American Masters documentary *Words from a Bear*.

### Remembering Rudolfo Anaya

Acclaimed Authors Denise Chávez and Luis Alberto Urrea Celebrate the Godfather of Chicano Literature

### Santa Fe International Literary Festival, 2 p.m., May 21, 2023

**Santa Fe, NM**—Acclaimed authors Denise Chávez and Luis Alberto Urrea will pay tribute to the legacy of the late New Mexico author Rudolfo Anaya, the celebrated godfather of Chicano literature and recipient of the National Medal of Arts, at the Santa Fe International Literary Festival. The event continues the Festival's tradition of honoring a significant New Mexico writer posthumously.

Chávez and Urrea, whose writings and perspectives are deeply influenced by Anaya, take the Festival stage with "Recuerdos y Respeto: Homage to Rudolfo Anaya" at the Santa Fe Community Convention Center at 2 p.m. on Sunday, May 21. The two will bring Anaya into the room with personal reminiscences of their friendship with the author, insights on his literary legacy, and select readings of his works.

A beloved son of Nuevo México, Anaya's 1972 breakout novel, *Bless Me, Ultima*, transformed the literary landscape of the late 20<sup>th</sup> century with a powerful exploration of Indo-Hispano identity in the Southwest. Today, the book has sold more than two million copies in English, and more than 80,000 in Spanish, in the U.S. alone, and has been translated into several languages. The author 's subsequent contributions to the international literary canon spanned a range of genres—fiction, nonfiction, playwrighting, poetry, children's literature, and more—increasing awareness of the political power of the Chicano movement, capturing the deeply rooted spirituality and cultural traditions of Nuevo México, and redefining the American experience for readers far beyond the Southwest.

By the end of his life in 2020, Anaya was a literary giant, recipient of the American Book

Award and the 2001 National Medal of Arts, the nation's highest honor for lifetime achievement. In a 2015 interview, shortly before receiving the National Humanities Medal from President Barack Obama, he summed up his literary vision, saying, ""The heart of New Mexico is, for me, the people, la gente —los compadres, las comadres, los tíos, las tías, los vecinos. It's the connection and the understanding between my Indo-Hispano cultures. If people don't make that connection, they don't understand New Mexico.

### **Influencing Generations**

As author, scholar, and activist, Anaya's desire to transform his mystical upbringing on the windswept llano of east central New Mexico into art, and his persistence in a mainstream publishing industry that initially rejected his bilingual expression and Chicano vision, paved the way for generations of writers, including Chávez, of Las Cruces, Anaya's close friend and protégé.

"For me, a young woman growing up in the desert of southern New Mexico, *Bless Me*, *Ultima* was a beacon of hope and gave me respite from the lack of seeing my own kin come to life in art and words. I thought to myself maybe someday, too, I could become a writer," Chávez said. "When I did meet Mr. Anaya and he became my mentor and teacher, I was challenged further when he asked me, point blank and without fanfare: 'So what are you going to do? Become a writer or what?""

Today, Chávez is the American Book Award-winning author of *The King and Queen of Comezón, Loving Pedro Infante, A Taco Testimony: Meditations on Family, Food and Culture,* and *Face of an Angel.* The owner of Casa Camino Real Bookstore in Las Cruces, she is widely known as an activist for books and writers in the New Mexico borderlands, including founding and directing the Border Book Festival in Las Cruces for 20 years until 2015. She is currently director and co-founder of the Border Servant Corps project, Libros para el Viaje/Books for the Journey, which delivers books to refugee, migrant, and asylum-seeking children and families on the U.S.–Mexico border.

For the multi-award-winning Urrea, who was born in Tijuana to a Mexican father and American mother, Anaya's Chicano expression of a dual-culture identity was also formative. Writing in the introduction to the 2022 Library of America anthology, *Anaya: Bless Me, Ultima, Tortuga, Alburquerque*, which he edited, Urrea recalled receiving Anaya's "wise counsel on my own long novels about *curanderismo*—books I could not have written if not for his *Bless Me, Ultima*."

Anaya's influence informed Urrea's celebrated historical novels *The Hummingbird's Daughter* and *Queen of America*, which together tell the epic story of Teresita Urrea, the author 's great-aunt who was a healer and Mexican folk hero. Urrea is also the author of books that span a range of genres, including *The Devil's Highway*, a nonfiction account of a group of Mexican immigrants lost in the Arizona desert, and the novels *Into the Beautiful North* and *The House of Broken Angels*. His newest novel, *Good Night, Irene*, inspired by his

mother's service in the Red Cross, will be available in advance of its May 30 publication at the Santa Fe International Literary Festival.

"Recuerdos y Respeto: Homage to Rudolfo Anaya" is also the inspiration behind several educational outreach initiatives and community collaborations intended to connect young readers, writers, and their families to Anaya's writings. The Festival and the Santa Fe Public Library will celebrate Anaya beginning May 3 with weekly children's story hours at various libraries, featuring guest readers presenting Anaya's bilingual books for children. National and local publishers have donated hundreds of books by Anaya to support the Festival's initiative to provide free books to participants in Anaya-related events at the libraries, at the Festival, and elsewhere in the community. Additionally, at 6 p.m. on May 22, the Jean Cocteau Cinema will present a free community screening of the 2012 feature film, *Bless Me, Ultima*, based on Anaya's classic 1972 novel and filmed in New Mexico.
